# **President's Message**

We started off on Tuesday with excellent training and workshops. A trip on the tram up to dramatic High Camp for a reception and dinner in one of the most beautiful places in the United States made for a breathtaking evening. There was so much snow the resort was still open for skiing on the weekends!

Tom Graziano, NWS Director of the Office of Water Prediction and Don Cline, **USGS** Associate Director for Water, officially commenced the conference Wednesday morning with informative and inspiring words of wisdom for the hydrological warning community. The venue for this years' workshop will be the historic Menger Hotel located at 204 Alamo Plaza in San Antonio, Texas.








# Hydrologic Conditions in the United States Through July 18, 2017
